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A Warrant Officer is - -

Soldier

- Soldier first!
- Train, deploy and follow orders

Leader

- Mentor and Trainer
- Must look after health and welfare of subordinates
- Manager

Technician

- Being a technician is a distinctive feature of warrant officers
- The Warrant Officer is the technical expert regardless of grade or time in service



Who becomes a Warrant Officer?

- Soldiers with above average skills, demonstrated ability and experience in a particular feeder MOS.
- As a Warrant Officer, your highly specialized skill is your most vital contribution.
- In addition to MOS qualifications, Warrant Officers are called upon to execute many leadership and managerial functions.
- A career as a Warrant Officer offers rewarding opportunities for leadership and growth.

Eligibility requirements

- SGT or higher *
- GT score of 110 or higher
- BNCOC graduate *
- 4 – 6 years experience in the field for which applying *
- Meet prerequisites as determined by the Warrant Officer proponent (check prerequisites and Warrant Officer job descriptions on the web at <www.usarec.army.mil/hq/warrant/warrant.htm>
- Within the age limits shown in the above prerequisites

* Not applicable to Aviation Candidates



Upon selection by the Centralized Army Selection Board (or National Guard Federal Recognition Board) the WOC selectee is programmed for WOCS & the Basic Course.

If a Warrant Officer Mentor is not assigned to you, you should seek out a warrant officer to instruct you on what you must do prior to attending WOCS. A good web site is <<http://usawocc.army.mil>> for information.

Training

Selected soldiers first attend the Warrant Officer Candidate School at Fort Rucker, AL. WOCS is 6 weeks long for active Army and Aviation candidates. ARNG & USAR candidates may opt for the WOCS-RC course lasting 4-weeks, or two 2-week periods completed within 24 months.

Next is the Warrant Officer Basic Course (WOBC). Courses vary in length depending on MOS. Reserve component WOBC may consist of a correspondence and resident phases that also vary in length.
